The city of Dunhuang

Dunhuang is located in the most western end of the Hexi corridor in the province of Gansu, China. Numerous places of interest and natural sceneries, as well as rich and colorful folk customs, make Dunhuang one of the most popular and famous tourism destinations of the Silk Road. Among China's

Grottoes, the Mingsha Sand Dunes and the Crescent Moon Spring.

2. TRANSFER ARRANGEMENT AND AIRPORT MEETING SERVICE

Transportation will be provided to all delegates upon arrival and departure from the meeting (Dunhuang Airport – Official Hotel of the Meeting – Dunhuang Airport). The transfer takes about 30 minutes. The

3. AIRPORT TAX

Foreigners are not required to pay any airport tax at Dunhuang Airport.

VISA REQUIREMENTS

Embassy, High Commission or Consulate prior travel to China.

PRACTICAL INFORMATION

EXCHANGE RATE

The Chinese currency unit is the Chinese Renmenbi (CNY). Notes are available in denominations of

100RMB, 50RMB, 20RMB, 10RMB, 1RMB.

Most tourist areas except and exchange American Dollars. The bank note, however, must be relatively new with no marking or tear. Traveller's cheques are exchanged in most large size banks or their respective sub-branches. The exchange-rate is approximately 1USD = 6.14RMB (source: Bank of China, May 2013)

CUSTOMS REGULATIONS

Upon arrival, foreign visitors are advised to fill in a Baggage Declaration Form.

Additionally, any person carrying more than the aggregate amount of USD 5,000 or CNY 20,000 into China must declare this at Customs. Please bear in mind that failure to abide to Chinese custom laws is a criminal offense that is prosecuted. In case you have any further questions regarding the custom laws of China, please contact the official customs service.

CLIMATE

Dunhuang has a continental climate, and it is expected to be quite hot during the period of the meeting. Temperatures, however, tend to drop at night. The average temperature in August ranges from 16.4°C to 32.3°C.

TIME ZONE

Dunhuang is 8 hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time (GMT +8.00).

OFFICIAL LANGUAGE

Chinese is the official language. English can be used at hotels and restaurants.

ELECTRICITY

Electricity in China is 220 Volts at 50 Hertz. Outlets in China generally accept NEMA plugs. Please bear in mind that you will need a converter if your appliances do not fit the requirements mentioned above.

BUSINESS HOURS

Government officials (e.g., immigration) work from 08:30 to 12:00 and from 14:30 to 17.30 (Monday to Friday). Banks open from 09:00 to 17:00. Government offices are closed on public holidays.

Department stores open around 10:00, and close between 20:00 and 22:00.

HEALTH

No vaccination is required.

The World Cultural Heritage - the Mogao Grottoes

The Mogao Grottoes, commonly known as the Caves of the Thousand Buddhas, and honored as the most valuable cultural discovery in the twentieth century, is located in Dunhuang, off the western end of the Hexi Corridor. The site is well known for its beautiful murals and sculptures: the cutting of the Mogao Grottoes began in the Jianyuan 2nd year of Qianqin (366 AD), and involved 16 Countries and Five Dynasties. It contains 735 caves, 492 caves being in the southern district and 243 caves in the northern district. This well-preserved heritage site contains some of the finest examples of Buddhist art. In 1987, it was listed as China's first world cultural heritage site by UNESCO.



The Mingsha Sand Dunes & Crescent Moon Spring

The Crescent Moon Spring unites both a clear spring and a daunting desert. The Lake's name derives from the crescent moon shape the small pool of spring water has taken between two large sand dunes. The formation of the lake resulted from a geological peculiarity - the north and south slopes are higher than the east and west - and from the wind which blows from west to east. The wind initially blows in a southeasterly direction, is then forced upwards where it rotates spirally before finally retreating in an easterly direction. As a result, the lake has never once become silted up with sand in 1000 years. Today, the Crescent Moon Spring is one of the key scenic spots and one of the top forty tourist attractions in China.

Yumenguan Pass & Yadan National Geological Park

The Yumenguan Pass is one of the two important passes on the western frontier of the Han Dynasty (206 BC - 220) lands. It is located 56 miles northwest of Dunhuang City, at the western end of Hexi Corridor. In ancient times, it was the crucial gateway from central China to the western regions. Climbing to the top of the pass one is able to see the relics of the Great Wall. As to the Yadan National Geological Park, it stretches twenty-five kilometers from north to south and about two kilometers from east to west. It features the unique and picturesque scenery of the Gobi desert.



Yadan National Geological Park

In the deep desert, about 180 kilometers northwest of Dunhuang city, lies the Yadan National Geological Park. The park stretches twenty-five kilometers from north to south and about two kilometers from east to west. It features the unique landscape of the Gobi desert. The original meaning of Yadan (Uyghur) is steep earth mound, which can be best explained as an arid erosion physiognomy. The landform is considered to be one of today's world wonders. In December 2001, the Ministry of Land and Resources approved the establishment of the "Gansu Dunhuang Yadan National Geological Park", which was formally inaugurated and opened to tourists in August 2003. In November 2006, it was evaluated as an AAAA tour scenic spot by the National Tourism Bureau.
