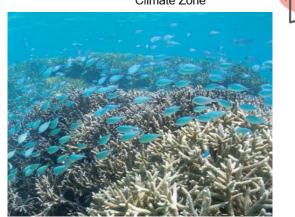

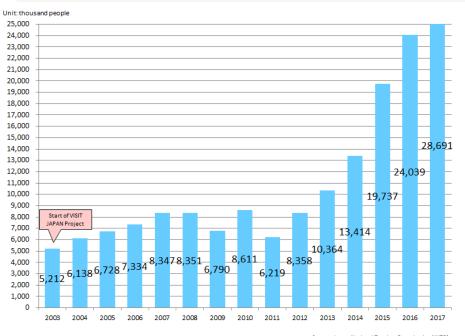

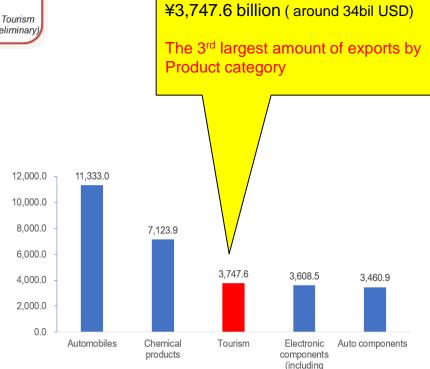

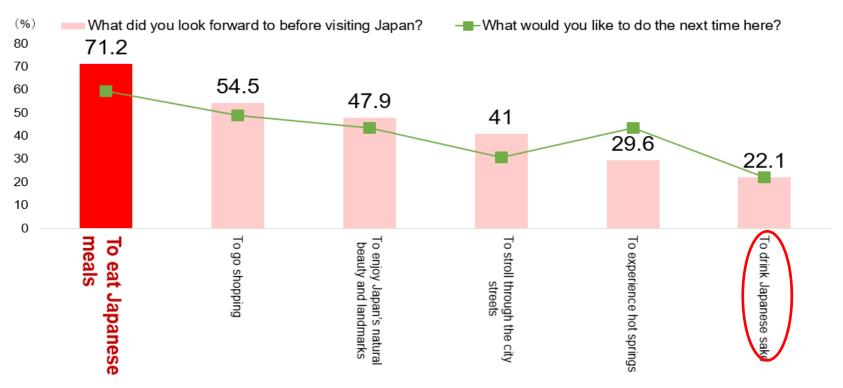

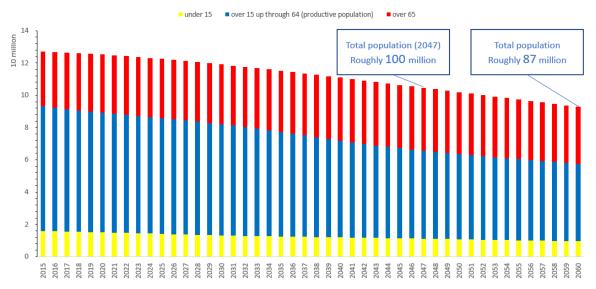

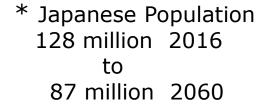

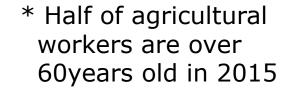
#### Trend/Forecast of Population Decline, Birthrate Decline and Aging



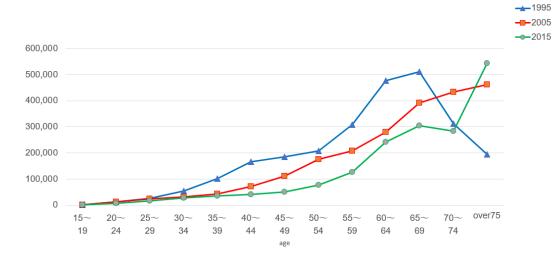


\* Population of productive ages (15 -64 years old )

- ✓ Joint research by UNWTO, Gurunavi and JTTA under the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between UNWTO and JTTA, December 2015 which aimed to bridge regional communities in Japan and the world, followed by the MOU between three parties April 2017.

- ✓ Research, analysis and editing conducted by editors (Gurunavi, JTTA and MRI)

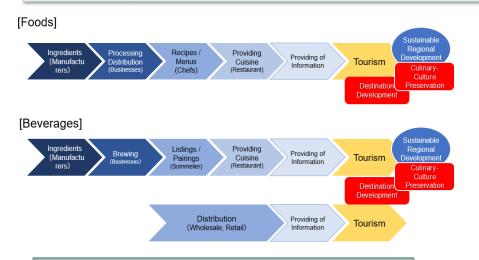


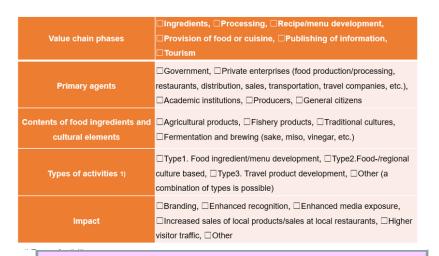
### Defined Gastronomy tourism in Japan

Gastronomy tourism is a form of tourism through which participants can experience the culinary culture of a given place, enjoying the regional foods created by the climate, the ingredients, the culture, customs, traditions, and history of that local area

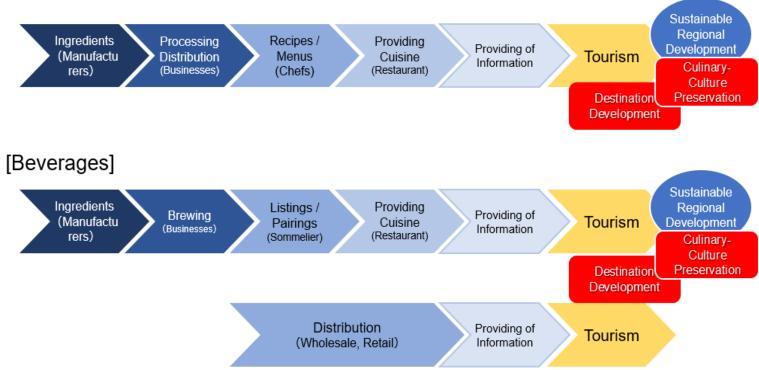

#### 1) Types of activities

Type1. Examples of food ingredient/menu development:

- · Publishing information on local food ingredients in collaboration with food producers and chefs
- Providing experiences of food production and cooking on-site
- Offering dishes that use local food ingredients at local restaurants, hotels, ryokan (Japanese inns), and auberges

Type2. Examples of food-/regional culture based:

- Leveraging culinary culture and history
- Re-creating and offering local dishes
- Leveraging traditional architecture and townscapes

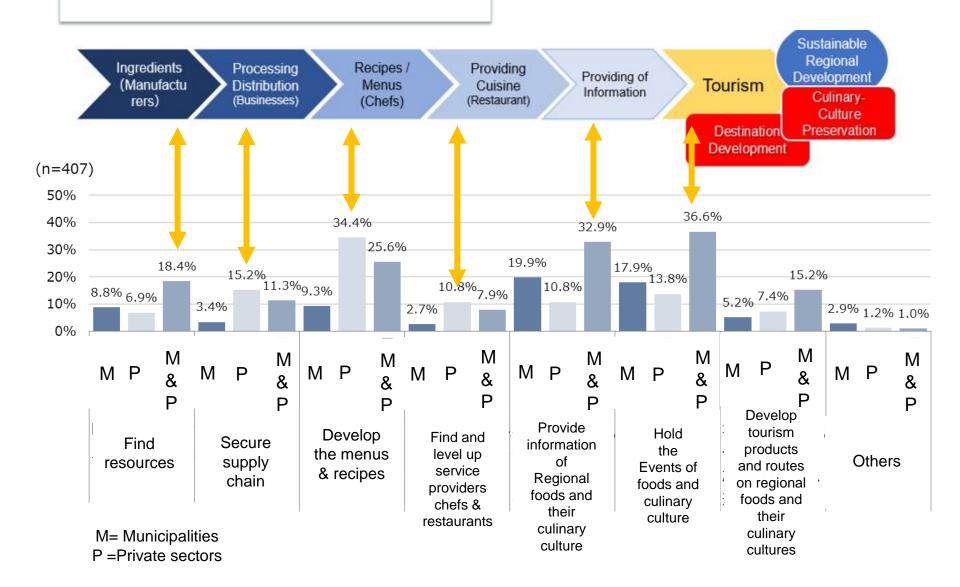

### Effects of initiatives promotion



- ✓ The percentages of cases which succeeded in region-specific preservation and handing-down of culinary culture are 29%, and which succeeded in trickle-down effect on producers are 19%.
  - ⇒ High ratio of collaboration between producers, producer organizations and academic institutions or (local )enterprises.
- ✓ The percentages of cases where tourism has been achieved are 17 % for commercialization of travel and 22 % for increased number of domestic visitors.
  - ⇒ High ratio of collaboration between producers, producer organizations or (local) enterprises.

## Municipalities Survey (5)



### Summary of municipalities survey

- ✓ Although the term "gastronomy tourism "is not well known in Japan, activities based on the concept of gastronomy tourism are already underway across nation.
- ✓ Japan's gastronomy tourism is the high proportion of public –private collaboration (65%) when compared to other nations (\*1). The interesting features of government-corporate partnerships in Japan is that many of them involve enterprises serving customers on a national basis.
- ✓ Only 17% of respondents of this survey noted their initiatives led to tourism (\*2)
- ✓ Promoting tourism by government officials in Japan are shifting their focus beyond a simple increase in economic impact for tourism industry, and instead are turning their focus to sustainable regional development. Policies are being implemented for encouraging agricultural and regional advances, developing human resources and create jobs.
  - Gastronomy tourism in Japan has begun to receive attentions as means for and resulting from the convergence of these distinct policies.

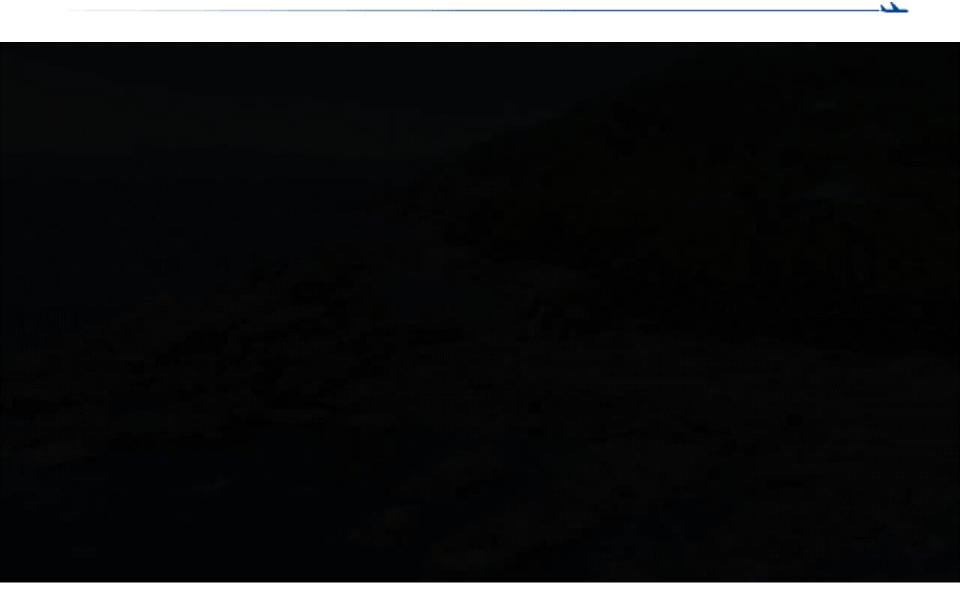
